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Minister's Message

Dear brothers and sisters,

As you should all know by now, we are receiving monthly "dossiers" of ongoing formation materials from CIOFS (the overall leadership of the Secular Franciscan Order). These "dossiers" include a section on the social doctrine of the Church, because the General Chapter in 2008 identified this as an area in which we need to grow in understanding. I was pleased to discover that the August materials actually address a doctrine that is very important to the way we govern the SFO.

The topic for August was subsidiarity. My simple way of looking at this technical term is that problems should be solved at the lowest possible level, by the people closest to the problem. In our political system, that means that something that can be done by a local government should be done there, rather than by the state or federal government. In the governance of the SFO, it means that local issues should be handled by local fraternities, regional issues by regional fraternities, etc. That seems pretty obvious, but it may be harder to see it that way when you want an issue to be resolved by someone else and it comes back to you! It is important, however, to avoid the temptation to quickly "fix" problems by imposing a solution from above, when in fact the people involved need to do the work (possibly with outside support) to come to a lasting solution.

On the other hand, there are some situations where a higher level fraternity sees the need to intervene because a serious problem is not being resolved. One of the reasons we have regularly scheduled visitations of every fraternity is to ensure that such problems are caught and addressed promptly. Even in those cases, subsidiarity will guide the higher level fraternity to do only as much as absolutely

necessary to ensure that the problem is resolved, and leave the rest to those involved.

Obviously, not everything can or should be decided at the local fraternity level - we wouldn't be an Order then, because everyone would just do their own thing. The challenge of subsidiarity is to balance a common direction with local adaptation, recognizing that one size does NOT fit all.

The CIOFS ongoing formation materials are an example of something that was deemed important enough to create and deliver to ALL Secular Franciscans worldwide! However, the way in which these materials are *used* is still up to the local fraternity.

Similarly, CIOFS has created new initial formation materials which are to be used worldwide, but our National Formation Commission is busy customizing the materials for use in the United States, and ultimately each fraternity will adapt the materials to the particular needs of its formation program. In both of these cases, a major topic (formation) was deemed to need a common approach for the whole SFO, but the details are left to lower levels to work out in accordance with their specific needs. THAT is subsidiarity.

I'm sure you can see that the balance between common direction and local adaptation can be an area where well-intentioned people may disagree. One person's necessary intervention may be another's authoritarianism. All of us, however, can take subsidiarity to heart and do our best to recognize how each of us can take personal action to make our own fraternities the best Franciscan "communities of love" they can be.

Let's begin with reflecting on the meaning of the Tau, our SFO symbol. We read in the *Major Legend of St. Francis* written by St. Bonaventure, the following: "The holy man (Francis) venerated this symbol with great affection, often spoke of it with eloquence and signed it with his own hand in the letters he sent, as if his whole desire were, according to the prophetic text, "to mark with a Tau the foreheads of those moaning and grieving" (Ezekiel 9:4) over the evils occurring in their day.

The following article was recently distributed by Franciscan Action Network (FAN). I thought it a good idea to share it with you all because I think it's worthy of your attention and also gives you a very good idea of the way in which FAN addresses these important issues.

REFLECT

First, please review the readings for the 21st and 22nd Sundays in Ordinary Time (August 22 and 29). Our Sunday Gospels have been coming to us from Luke for the last several weeks. One of the themes in the 21st Sunday readings is the stranger from afar, and sharing the Good News with him. She comes, gathered by the LORD (in Isaiah) to see God's glory; the psalm, exhorts us to "Go out to all the world and tell the Good News." In this time where much emphasis is placed on fear, what Good News are we sharing with the world? Are we sharing the Good News of a God who gathers all of the nations together, a God of love, a God who calls the people from the "east and the west and from the north and the south ... (to) recline at table in the kingdom of God"?

Our God is not a God of fear, for as Timothy tells us, "God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and love and sound mind." (2 Tim 1:7) If we have been called to share this Good News with the world, are we living in such a way, that people are drawn to the Good News, as people were drawn to Francis and Clare?

We are called to embrace the immigrant, to hear his and her story, to share our story with them. It is only in this shared living of lives, that we can truly live out of love, for as we begin to welcome the stranger, they no longer are stranger, but rather, they are known.

The 22nd Sunday's readings continue this theme. The psalm claims, "God, in your goodness, you have made a home for the poor" and in the Gospel, Jesus tells us a parable about attending a wedding banquet. Jesus continues by calling us to invite "the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind" to the banquet we host. These people, those who are minors, are the ones with whom we are called to share our abundance. On August 21, we celebrated the feast day of Pius X, who was a third order member of the Franciscans. Pius X had a heart for the poor and was known to have said, "I was born poor, I have lived poor, and I wish to die poor." Let us try to welcome those who seem different from us, especially the poor.

ACT

While FAN continues to work for comprehensive immigration reform (CIR), we are now also putting our energy into the DREAM Act, in conjunction with the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Justice for Immigrants (JFI). The DREAM Act is NOT a substitute for CIR; however it is an important component.

What is the DREAM Act? It is a measure that was introduced on March 26, 2009 by Sen. Richard Durbin (D-IL) that would serve to provide legal status and educational opportunities to those who entered the U.S. as minor children. To learn more, visit www.usccb.org and search for Justice for Immigrants. You are encouraged to contact your representative and senators in Congress to support the DREAM Act. You can do that easily on the FAN web site - www.franciscanaction.org.

PRAY

An interfaith group, sponsored by The New Sanctuary Movement, gathers together on the first Thursday of each month at 12:00p.m. in front of the Immigrations and Customs Enforcement (ICE) building in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. They gather in prayerful solidarity with families who have been affected by deportation. The service lasts about a half-hour and includes songs, petitions, the reading of the names of people deported or waiting to be deported, and a closing prayer.

FAST

As an example, the Wheaton Franciscans (also an institutional member of FAN) joined in efforts of faith communities around the country by fasting on July 13 for immigration reform, concluding with an evening prayer service in the Motherhouse chapel.
